Grants

The use of the Pupil Development Grant (PDG) and Education Improvement Grant (EIG)2020-21 by Penygarn Community Primary School:

- The total number of pupils on school roll for September 2020 was 427- does not include Nursery age pupils.
- The school's pupil with free school meals population is 53%
- This is greater than the population for the previous year

The school undertakes the following activities in order to support and develop pupils facing the challenges.

- Provision of small intervention groups to raise standards in literacy and Numeracy skills including
- Provision of small intervention groups to raise standards in numeracy skills through the use of support for additional learning opportunities.
- Provision for emotional wellbeing and nurture groups.
- Development of social skills during playtimes through training of staff in positive playtime strategies and the staffing to support through activities at unstructured times.
- The costs for staff training to develop a numeracy rich learning environment
- The costs for training workshop and resources to support strategies for numerical reasoning across the school
- Family Learning workshops that support parents in a consistent approach with effective strategies to support spelling, reading and mental maths.
- Training and professional development for teaching staff to provide an engaging learning environment and outdoor provision.
- Training and continued professional development for all staff in readiness for the new Additional Learning Needs Act and the New Welsh Curriculum.











Attendance Information Gwybodaeth am bresenoldeb

Regular attendance at school is essential if children are to reach their potential. In accordance with Welsh Government Guidelines, we cannot authorise parents to take children on holiday during term time for this inevitably has an adverse effect on their progress at school. We seek to ensure that children also appreciate the importance of coming to school regularly.

Extended holidays become a matter for consideration by the L.A. We also have clear guidelines from the Welsh Government which allow us to authorise absences for medical appointments, days of religious observations, external examinations etc. You are advised however; extensive amounts of authorised absence can be just as damaging to continuity of learning as unauthorised absence. Schools therefore need to authorise absence sparingly and only after careful consideration, particularly where pupils have a history of irregular attendance

School Links with the Community, Business & Industry Cysylltiadau gyda'r gymuned, busnes a diwydiant.

The school is keen to promote links with local businesses and other organisations within our community and benefits greatly from their support.

We have strong links with both West Monmouth and Abersychan High School and the cluster Primary Schools. We aim to ensure a smooth transition for our Year 6 pupils as they move to High School. Visits are planned each year giving opportunities to attend a range of. Regular Liaison Meetings take place between teachers of all cluster schools in a number of areas including: English, Mathematics, Science, the Humanities, Music, Welsh, Assessment and Additional Needs. High School teachers visit in the Summer Term to meet the children of Year 6 and to consult with teachers. Teachers work hard to share all relevant information in the knowledge that regular liaison between teachers ensures progress and continuity during this important period of transition.

Musically, the school encourages children actively to participate in a wide variety of music groups, perform in concerts, listen to visiting music groups and celebrate the musical successes of our pupils by listening to the school guitar and penny whistle groups and individual and group performances in school. Instrumental lessons are given on a weekly basis by the peripatetic staff for pupils to learn string, wind, and percussion instruments. We are always pleased to celebrate the music examination successes of many of our pupils during the year.

Children have many opportunities to listen to a wide range of speakers from various agencies. These include our community police liaison officer, Assembly Members, school nurse, the fire brigade, and a wide range of parents and governors with specialist skills and knowledge. We continue to enjoy the positive contribution made by parents at the school. As in previous years, parents have been actively involved in the school in a number of ways. Parents have accompanied children on school trips while some give regularly of their time to support children's learning within the classroom

Curriculum Organisation and teaching

At Penygarn Community Primary School, we support the concept of lifelong learning, recognising that both adults at school and children learn new things every day. We maintain that learning should be a rewarding and enjoyable experience for everyone. Through our teaching we seek to equip children with the skills, knowledge and understanding necessary to be able to make informed choices about the important things in their lives. We recognise that people learn best in different ways: most lessons incorporate aspects to support pupils who learn best through visual, audio and kinaesthetic approaches. We aim to provide a rich and varied learning environment that supports children in developing their skills and abilities in a range of ways, in order to achieve to their full potential. Through our teaching we aim to:

- Support children in becoming confident, resourceful, enquiring and independent learners;
- Foster children's self-esteem and help them build positive relationships with other people;
- Develop children's self-respect and encourage them to respect the ideas, attitudes, values and feelings of others;
- Show respect for all cultures and, in so doing, to promote positive attitudes towards other people;
- Enable children to understand their community and help them feel valued as part of this community;
- Help children grow into reliable, independent and positive citizens by celebrate the achievements of both children and staff.

The Additional Learning Needs Policy incorporates the statutory Code of Practice for Additional Needs and aims to provide equal access to the curriculum for all children.















Welsh Language

Yr laith Gymraeg

It is important that the children of Penygarn Community Primary School are taught Welsh as a second language. It enriches their knowledge and understanding of the culture and heritage of Wales. It develops their personalities and ability to contribute to the community giving them a sense of place and identity.

We recognise that very few children at our school who speak Welsh at home and that school is often their only contact with the language and culture of Wales.

The aims of teaching Welsh are:

- to develop pupils' knowledge, understanding and skills within an integrated programme of speaking and listening, reading and writing;
- to create a Welsh ethos within which to promote the teaching of the Welsh language;
- to create opportunities for children to enjoy the rich heritage of Wales;
- celebrate the traditions and culture of Wales;
- to offer children opportunities to perform and compete in Welsh during school assemblies, concerts and Eisteddfodau.

Anti Bullying

At Penygarn Community RC Primary School there is zero tolerance on bullying. We are committed to ensuring that bullying does not and will not negatively impact upon the wellbeing and educational standards of the children who attend our school. The anti-bullying policy has been updated to include sections on cyber bullying and to offer sources of support to parents, should they believe that their child is the victim of bullying. The school is determined to ensure that our school is a supportive environment that has an open and transparent attitude to bullying and the measures that we are taking to eliminate it.

How do we make sure our pupils are healthy, safe and well-supported?

The development of healthy lifestyles is a target priority for our school. We encourage healthy snacks and reward pupils for bringing healthy lunches. We have established a 'Healthy Hwb' pupil group as part of our Y Senedd who will meet regularly, set targets and move the school forward in this area.

Pupils have access to drinking water throughout the day. The children take part in a range of activities to ensure that they feel safe, and staff and governors receive annual child protection training.

We incorporate the PSHE curriculum through class sessions, assemblies and circle times. Feedback from pupil and parent surveys are taken very seriously and comments are used to address any issues to ensure our pupils feel safe in school. St Patricks RC Primary school has robust safeguarding and child protection procedures including safe recruitment.

Provision of toilet facilities

The school provides sufficient toilets for the number of pupils on roll. These toilets are cleaned on a daily basis









There is a range of activities available to pupils over and above the National Curriculum. We are always seeking to improve and enrich our provision to develop children's enthusiasm for learning. This includes the use of and development of ICT skills across the curriculum. Visits out and visitors in are widely used to support the curriculum and to make learning relevant to our children. This includes linking with our local and wider community.

The school usually provides a range of sporting and extra-curricular activities and children are consulted about choices of after school clubs. Some of those which are offered include cookery, football, rugby, netball, art and Coding Club. We operate a Children's University that provides further enrichment for the children. These courses include STEAM. Modern Foreign Languages Art to name but a few.

The School continues to support Parish Mass but this year via live stream basis.

Pupils have had the opportunity to engage in a range of home links.

The Parents Teachers and Friends Association of Penygarn is a small but highly dedicated and enthusiastic band of parents that have worked hard for the good of the children over the year. They have supported the school well with supporting trips, treats and resources.

Thank you all very much; your support is really appreciated. Thanks to their generosity, we have been able to purchase a school defibrillator and provided Yr. 6 with wonderful leaving T shirts and goody bags

Links with Wider Community

The School pupil voice groups has continued to develop and continues to do good work and has an influence on school development; reviewing policies and school improvements.

Links with Gwent Police have continued to develop and all classes have enjoyed presentations by the police and Network rail on various aspects of safety and citizenship.





Pupils this year have been given the opportunity to engage in a number of community initiatives:

Penygarn continues to fly the flag for sustainable development, maintaining its Platinum flag for its work in Education for Sustainable Development and Global Citizenship.

Penygarn maintains a Fairtrade status.

Penygarn maintains its links with Healthy School's wales, being awarded Phase 3 leaf and continues to work towards developing this- again this work was cut short with the closure on the 17th March.

We have seen a great uptake of pupils learning to play an instrument.

Families and children continue to be very generous in supporting others. Last year we raised money for several charities thanks to everyone's efforts. Charities supported include, Macmillan, NSPCC, and Jeans for Genes, and Children in Need and cancer charities

Well-Being and Health Education

We continue to work with all stakeholders to promote a healthy lifestyle. This is done through our Personal and Social Education programme.

There continues to be a universal acceptance and provision of fruit at break-time.

The percentage of children taking up the school meal service is steady.

Breakfast Club in 2020-2021 has been a great success. We can serve over 105 breakfasts a day. We are compliant with all aspects of the Disability and Discrimination statutes.

How are we making sure that every child gets teaching to meet their individual needs?

As a school we wish to continue to build on high standards through exciting learning. The school identifies and supports children with specific needs including More Able & Talented children.

The school has named Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator (ALNCO) and More Able & Talented (MAT) Co-ordinator. Progress is carefully monitored and tracked, intervention programmes are in place and if external support is thought necessary, this is sought.



The school has a close working relationship with parents/carers as they are kept informed and involved. Pupil voice is sought in developments at Penygarn Community Primary school, including those in the curriculum.

Teaching Assistants reinforce and support learning effectively, working with groups and/or individuals depending on the needs identified.

Teachers assess all pupils' learning both formally and informally and targets are discussed and regularly reviewed with pupils. Minority and underachieving groups are supported and their progress is specifically tracked so that they attain their potential.
